O HISTORY

The descendant of a line of ancestors going back to the Middle Ages, the French Union of Shooting Associations (Union des Sociétés de Tir de France) was created in 1886. After the merging of several closely linked associations within the USTF, the French Shooting Sports Federation (Fédération Française de Tir) was founded in 1967. This non-profit making association has been officially recognised as serving the public good since 1971.

THE FRENCH SHOOTING SPORTS FEDERATION \bigcirc

The French Shooting Sports Federation acts on behalf of the Ministry of Sports. It is an active member of CNOSF (French National Olympic and Sports Committee - Comité National Olympique et Sportif Français) and of CPSF (French National Paralympic and Sports Committee - Comité National Paralympique et Sportif Français). Its president is currently Michel BACZYK and its National Senior Manager Gilles MULLER.


More than 130 types of events of which 15 are Olympic and 13 Paralympic. 26 championships organised in France each year. Over 4,000 participants in the French Championship for 10 meters shooting, and more than 2,000 for the Shooting Schools Championship (shooters plus supervisors). The next European championship 25/50/300/RT and shotgun will take place in France. The CNTS has ever welcome 2 WSPS Word Cup quotas and the 2022 world championship Running Target.

SPORTING ACHIEVEMENTS \bigcirc

16 Olympic medals since 1972: 4 Golds, 8 Silvers 4 Bronzes. 80 individuals medallists at the World Championships since 1972 : 29 Golds, 23 Silvers 28 Bronzes. 233 individuals World Cup medallists since 1986 : 84 Golds, 69 Silvers 80 Bronzes. 19 Crystal Gobles since 1986.



Several years of significant progress



The French Shooting Sports Federation is willing to increase female Shooting Sports practice. Its Sports Policy includes a Plan for Feminisation focused on five main axis: access to decision-making bodies, practicing increase, high performance sport, arbitration and technical coaching. The number of women practicing Shooting Sports is around 11,5%. Among top sportspersons, they represent 45% of the population.

Para-shooting

Since January 1st, 2017, the French Shooting Sports Federation integrated para-shooters, with appropriate delegation of responsibilities from the Ministry for Sport. It is now in charge of four main families of events: Pistol, Rifle, Shotgun and Visually Impaired.

National Shooting Sports Centre (Centre National de Tir Sportif or CNTS)

The CNTS in Châteauroux-Déols is one of the largest shooting ranges in the world. It has shooting ranges from 10 to 600 meters, with 5 shotgun ranges and 220 shooting lanes for olympic disciplines. Since 2022, the CNTS has its own modular "finals" range at 10, 25 and 50 meters. It is full property of the FFTir.

An ambitious Centre with both a national and an international vocation :

As of today the French National Shooting Sports Centre (CNTS) is on the list of sites able to host the biggest national and international competitions: World Championships, World Cup, European Championships, French Championship etc.

The French National Shooting Sports Center (CNTS) is also at the heart of federal development schemes. It allows the National Technical Committee to organise training modules for the French teams, preparation periods for large sporting events and specific training courses: referees, coaches, doctors, physiotherapists, etc. It will also be accessible to foreign teams.

For the French Shooting Sports Federation, the French National Shooting Sports Centre CNTS represents a home for all shooters. Time slots are regularly reserved for leagues, clubs or even individual members. It is also used from time to time as a tool to enable companies to introduce their employees to the shooting sports.

In 2024, CNTS hosted the Olympic and Paralympic Games.
